

MEMBERSHIP AND PUBLICATIONS

ISPCAN's membership is made up of over 1600 professionals from a variety of disciplines working to prevent all forms of child abuse and maltreatment in their respective countries. Reflecting the organization's traditional commitment to building a multidisciplinary response to child abuse, ISPCAN's membership includes professionals from the fields of law enforcement, justice, medicine, psychology, education, sociology, social work, research and public policy.

USING THE LATEST TECHNOLOGY TO BRING ISPCAN MEMBERS TOGETHER

For the past several years, ISPCAN has placed increased attention on using the Internet and related technologies to create greater opportunities to inform and link this diverse membership. The ISPCAN web page, member LISTSERV and virtual issue forums have allowed members to ask questions and share information with their colleagues throughout the world on an ongoing basis. Members no longer need to wait for conferences or meetings to learn about emerging best practices or new policy or service innovations. ISPCAN's information system has created a way for members to have ongoing contact with each other as well as with national and international agencies addressing the problems of child abuse and child victimization.

ISPCAN'S WEB PAGE AND MEMBERSHIP SERVICE NETWORK

ISPCAN's web page offers publications, reports, and documents on child abuse issues, as well as links to other key resources. In addition to a public resource area, open to all individuals interested in learning more about child abuse and neglect worldwide, the site features a special Member Only Area that includes a searchable Membership Directory, professional position papers and periodic, and issue-based internet discussion forums facilitated by ISPCAN Faculty.

MEMBER LISTSERV

A valuable vehicle for ongoing member networking, the LISTSERV is available to members on a 24-hour basis to pose questions, respond to queries listed by others, and to request peer consultation on case issues. The listserv offers a simple and effective means of communicating with colleagues around the globe. The listserv witnessed increased activity in year 2002, with over 200 messages being posted. Key topics discussed on the LISTSERV included Institutional Abuse, Legislation/Reporting laws, Cultural perceptions of abuse issues, Assessment Tools, Request for Financial support/resources, Interviewing skills/methods, Parenting, Mental Health Services, and Conference and Training Updates.

VIRTUAL ISSUES DISCUSSION FORUM

Introduced in December 2002, ISPCAN's Faculty-led "Virtual Issues Discussion Forum" brings information and related in-depth discussion to participating members to further their understanding of child abuse issues. The first forum, conducted over a three day period in December 2002, focused on "Institutional Abuse – Contributing Factors of Harm." Professionals from Canada, United Kingdom, Russia, and the United States initiated the discussion and fielded questions from the membership.

ISPCAN PUBLICATIONS LEAD THE FIELD IN DISSEMINATING EMERGING RESEARCH AND PRACTICE INNOVATIONS

From its inception, ISPCAN has sought to identify and report the most promising and significant research and practice reforms being implemented by professionals around the world. Our peer review journal and related publications offer a variety of ways to disseminate information to policy makers and practitioners. In 2002, innovations were implemented in all of our publications to make them more accessible to the full scope of our membership.

CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT: THE INTERNATIONAL JOURNAL

The Child Abuse and Neglect: The International Journal is the official publication of the International Society for Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (ISPCAN). This monthly publication provides an international, multidisciplinary forum on all aspects of child abuse and neglect. One of the most influential and highly cited journals in the field, the journal publishes over 120 papers each year from more than ten disciplines. All abstracts are published in English, Spanish and French. The current editor is John M. Leventhal, MD, Professor of Pediatrics, Yale University.

WORLD PERSPECTIVES:

THE FIFTH INTERNATIONAL DATABOOK ON CHILD ABUSE

Published for the fifth time in 1992, this bi-annual publication reports on the status of child abuse incidence and policy worldwide. WORLD PERSPECTIVES represents the most comprehensive and current source for international data on the status of child abuse and methods for addressing its treatment and prevention. The primary method for establishing this "world perspective" has been to find informed persons representing as many countries as possible and ask those people to describe the current status of responses to child maltreatment for his or her nation. In the first survey, 30 countries were represented. In the fifth (2002) study there were 115 countries contacted and 67 responses collected. The sixth edition of World Perspectives is currently under development and will be released at ISPCAN's 15th International Congress on Child Abuse in Brisbane in 2004.

LINK NEWSLETTER

The LINK serves as a platform for members to exchange information on best practice strategies and child protection policy developments emerging within their countries. The newsletter, published three times a year, also includes information on all ISPCAN activities and other relevant professional education programs. The LINK is published both in English and Spanish. In 2002, the LINK's practice forum examined the unique practice and policy concerns surrounding cases of child neglect, adolescent maltreatment and international adoptions.

ISPCAN HISTORY BOOK

To recognize ISPCAN's silver anniversary and document the evolution of the identification and response to child maltreatment worldwide, several ISPCAN leaders and members collected their perspectives and memories of ISPCAN and the battles fought to recognize child abuse into a history book in 2002. The essays, written by several dozen of the organization's leadership and broader membership, describe ISPCAN's founders, programs (e.g., Congresses, trainings, regional conferences, the Journal and the Link) and organizational evolution. An International Movement to End Child Abuse: The Story of ISPCAN provides not only a summary of ISPCAN's history but also a summary of how the issue of child abuse has emerged over the past 30 years as a central child welfare concern around the world.

CONGRESS ABSTRACTS: RESEARCH & PRACTICE

This publication series includes summaries of the papers presented at each ISPCAN's Congresses. Each abstract also includes full contact information on the author or authors. In addition to being available to delegates attending each Congress, the material also is made available to members electronically on the ISPCAN member page.



ISPCAN 14TH INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS - CELEBRATING 25 YEARS

ISPCAN CELEBRATES ITS PAST AND CHARTS COURSE FOR THE FUTURE
July 7-10, 2002 (Denver, USA)

With a deep respect for past accomplishments and an eye toward the challenges ahead, over 900 child abuse professionals and concerned volunteers gathered in Denver, Colorado in July to participate in the 14th International Congress on Child Abuse and Neglect. Co-sponsored by ISPCAN, the Kempe Children's Foundation and the Kempe Children's Center, the event offered participants opportunities to share their own knowledge, to learn from others and to build stronger relationships with colleagues from around the world.

Under the theme "Charting Our Progress Toward Protection of Children Worldwide," the five-day meeting began with a pre-Congress forum for representatives from developing countries. Topics covered during this two-day meeting included the unique challenges facing professionals working with reduced resources, effective intervention and policy strategies for addressing child abuse in the context of trauma and war, and strategies for supporting homeless street children.

This meeting provided an opportunity for the 53 scholars from developing countries sponsored by ISPCAN to attend the Congress to meet each other and discuss their common concerns. The Congress itself also provided numerous opportunities for these individuals to establish important linkages with ISPCAN leaders, faculty and other colleagues from their regions.

At the Congress, ISPCAN celebrated its 25th anniversary and commemorated the 40th anniversary of the publication of "The Battered Child Syndrome," the

landmark article written by Dr. C. Henry Kempe that brought the problems of abuse and neglect to public attention worldwide. The Congress also marked the 30th anniversary of the Kempe Children's Center, founded by Dr. Kempe.

The Congress was chaired by Dr. Richard Krugman, and some of the keynote speakers included Karin Landgren, UNICEF; Dr. Professor Margaret Lynch, Newcomen Centre, Guy's Hospital, and Jaap Doek, Chairman, UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. The Congress program included the ISPCAN master class, plenary sessions, mini-plenary sessions, symposia, research presentations, poster sessions, and workshops. Specific highlights included comprehensive reviews of what we have learned in the field of child abuse and neglect over the past thirty years and how these lessons can be best applied in crafting future interventions; reflections on the U.N. Convention on the Rights of the Child and its implementation is improving the conditions for children worldwide; and presentations on promising practice and policy initiatives underway in both the developed and developing regions of the world.

Throughout the Congress, participants were asked to write down at least one action they would accomplish in the coming year to improve child protection in their community. These commitments were then combined into an impressive paper chain carried into the meeting at the end of the Congress by Denver school children. This chain symbolized the power of what may seem like small, individual actions when they are combined with the efforts of others. During the coming years, ISPCAN and its members are committed to implementing these and other efforts to insure that we continue to make progress in our efforts to address child abuse worldwide.

ISPCAN Presents Annual Awards at Congress

Every two years, ISPCAN recognizes individuals and organizations that have made a substantial contribution to our efforts to respond to child maltreatment. The specific awards and most recent recipients are noted below.

2002 C. Henry Kempe Award – Jordan River Foundation, represented by Hala Hammad

The C. Henry Kempe Award, established in 1986, is intended to bring international visibility to the accomplishments of young professionals or organizations, to assist their work, and to inspire others to follow their lead. The Jordan River Foundation was the first center in the Arab world that specialized in the rehabilitation and protection of victims of abuse and their families.

2002 C. Henry Kempe Lecturer – Dr. David Gough

The C. Henry Kempe lectureship was established in 1986 to honor Dr. Kempe's vision and commitment to improving the lives of children worldwide. This year's recipient, Dr. David Gough, is Acting Head and Deputy Director of the Social Science Research Unit and its Evidence for Policy and Practice Information and Coordinating Center (EPPI-Center), Institute of Education, University of London.

2002 Distinguished Career Service Awards – Dr. Kari Killen and Dominique Girodet



The Distinguished Career Service Awards are given by ISPCAN to recognize an outstanding professional, National Partner or organization represented by an ISPCAN member for their long-standing dedication, expertise, and contributions to the field of child abuse and neglect. This year the Awards Committee voted to highlight the careers of two individuals. Dr. Kari Killen has been active in developing the Nordic Network for Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect and served as ISPCAN President from 1994-1996. Dominique Girodet was a founding member of ISPCAN and was instrumental in establishing the French Association for Information and Research on Child Abuse and Neglect (AFIREM).

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Dear ISPCAN Members,

The end of 2002 found ISPCAN in a challenging, but positive position. We are pleased to acknowledge the important role so many members continue to play in making ISPCAN an effective world leader for preventing

child abuse and neglect. As we state in our mission, ISPCAN is increasingly providing support to "individuals and organizations working to protect children worldwide." There is much being done by ISPCAN's Executive Councilors, our Expert Faculty, and those developing ISPCAN training and education programs around the world. As noted throughout this annual report, ISPCAN's impact is expanding through our sustained commitment to fostering important collaborations among ISPCAN members, international agencies and funding organizations. Our work in providing critical support, training, education, resources and information is having impacts far beyond ISPCAN's earlier more less ambitious goals to be a resource, but a less active force globally.

ISPCAN is now entering a transformation period in which the Society will play an increasingly stronger role in supporting major international efforts in child protection and child abuse prevention. In the coming year, we plan to continue with our 2002 goals and build an even stronger foundation on which to support the work of our increasing number of members and collaborative partnerships. We would like to invite you to reflect on ISPCAN's objectives, which guide the work of our staff, Executive Council, and Committees (see sidebar).

For almost a decade, the ISPCAN leadership has strategically guided the organization through dramatic changes, such as internal reorganization, program expansion, improved membership services, extended use of the Internet and electronic communication strategies and external relationships. Collectively, these changes have greatly improved our ability to support our members and realize our mission.

Since its inception as a professional society in 1977, the organization has increased its programs and services from publishing the widely regarded Child Abuse and Neglect: The International Journal and hosting biennial International Congresses offering a diverse array of programs. Today, ISPCAN provides the following additional services and resources to our members and all those involved in child protection worldwide:

- Sponsoring an increasing number of Regional Conferences to facilitate linkages among professionals in all areas of world;
- Hosting Global Institutes and Master Classes on key challenges facing the field at major national and international meetings;
- Sponsoring advanced Training Seminars that build local capacity in developing countries to better document, treat and prevent all forms of maltreatment;
- Increasing our financial support of professionals in developing countries through our Developing Country Scholarship Program and Honorary Developing Country Memberships;
- Expanding membership services through the development of electronic communication systems such as the Member Web Page (with its literature reviews, general information and searchable membership directory), Member Listserv and Virtual Issues Discussions;
- Supporting and linking the work of national professionals societies focusing on child abuse prevention through our National Partnership program;

- Improving our publications system through the expansion of the organization's newsletter (the LINK), producing a series of Fact Sheets on key dilemmas in child abuse, producing biannual reports on the status of the child abuse problem worldwide (World Perspectives) and working with the World Health Organization (WHO) in producing Intersectoral Child Abuse and Neglect Guidelines; and

- Fostering stronger relationships and developing joint projects with major international organizations addressing issues of violence and its impacts on children such as WHO, UNICEF and the United Nations.

In the coming year, ISPCAN will continue to review its governance principles, scope and strategic direction. We also want to focus on measuring the impact of our individual programs and general organizational presence. We will continue to strengthen our financial position by actively seeking greater foundation and international agency support. Such resources are essential for sustaining our current activities and providing us the ability to address additional needs as they arise. Our goal is to provide maximum support to our individual members and organizational partners as they work to effectively address violence issues and protect children in their local countries and regions.

ISPCAN OBJECTIVES

- 1) To increase awareness of the extent, the causes and possible solutions for all forms of child abuse.**
- 2) To disseminate academic and clinical research to those in positions to enhance practice and improve policy.**
- 3) To support international efforts to promote and protect the Rights of the Child.**
- 4) To improve the quality of current efforts to detect, treat and prevent child abuse.**
- 5) To facilitate the exchange of best practice standards being developed by ISPCAN members throughout the world.**
- 6) To design and deliver comprehensive training programs to professionals and concerned volunteers engaged in efforts to treat and prevent child abuse.**

Now is a very promising time for us to achieve our mission. The World Report on Violence and Health, issued by the WHO in 2002, makes some very specific recommendations for violence prevention at all levels. ISPCAN, with and through its members and partners, can benefit from the political clout of this report, as with the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, and work to ensure that its recommendations are fulfilled. With the critical participation and commitment of our members, financial partners (e.g., UNICEF, WHO, the Oak Foundation, Children-at-Risk, the Interchurch Development Organization (ICCO), the U.S. Department of Justice) and National Partnership members, we will continue our efforts to ensure that ISPCAN is an effective and positive agent for change in insuring all children have access to quality child protection.

Thank you for your support and we value your partnership. Please continue your active participation and commitment to strengthening ISPCAN's efforts. By strengthening our community of ISPCAN professionals and affiliates dedicated to child abuse prevention we strengthen the effectiveness of child protection efforts worldwide. Since violence exists throughout the lifecycle, our prevention work with children holds great promise in crafting a better future for all.

FINANCIAL DATA (SELECTED)

While ISPCAN membership dues continue to serve as a major revenue source for the organization, we have increasingly worked and found success in securing grants from private donors. These grants, and particularly the support of the Oak Foundation, ICCO, Children-at-Risk, UNICEF and the World Health Organization, have allowed us to expand our training and technical assistance efforts in developing countries. Another major revenue source includes royalties from the ISPCAN Journal. Our recent decline in investment income reflects current changes in the U.S.A. economy.

Through careful financial management of our reserves and new revenues, ISPCAN invests its resources in ways that reflect its mission to serve members and the child protection field. Major expense areas include supporting Congresses and regional conferences; training in developing countries; and providing members with the ISPCAN Journal and related publications. It is important to note that ISPCAN resources are enhanced thanks to the significant volunteer work of our ISPCAN members and National Partner members. ISPCAN's administrative and operational costs remain relatively low, representing only about 20% of our total expenses.

ISPCAN is a professional membership organization focused on developing Child Abuse Prevention expertise, programs and education world-wide. Two types of members are available for the duration of one or two years: Developing country members pay \$50 (1 year) and \$95 (2 years). Other members pay \$115 and \$210 respectively.



Financial Audit 2002

ISPCAN audited financial results for 2002: Current Assets at the end of 2002 were \$743,029. Property & Equipment at Cost (minus depreciation) was 42,700. Total Assets were 785,729. At the end of 2002, Total Assets were \$785,729 and Liabilities were 258,816, bringing ISPCAN's year-end Net Assets to \$526,913. This is a net decrease of \$19,163.

NATIONAL PARTNERS

In 1999, ISPCAN launched a new program to increase its participation with child abuse and neglect prevention professionals and organizations around the world. Our National Partnership Program sought out existing national child abuse prevention societies as well as members interested in creating such organizations to join with ISPCAN in forming a global professional network working to prevent child abuse and neglect. By the end of 2002, ISPCAN had accepted 15 organizations into this program.

ISPCAN believes that effective and sustainable child abuse prevention is achieved through education and professional cooperation. To that end, our National Partnership Program supports local professional societies in their efforts to expand training, education, and public awareness efforts in their respective regions and countries. ISPCAN and its partners' strength lies in the strong commitment of our individual professional members who willingly share that knowledge and resources with each other and who are open to learning from their colleagues.

Through this network approach, ISPCAN is uniting the efforts of organizations and individual professionals in ways that create a more effective and powerful voice for child protection worldwide. ISPCAN believes this effort will strengthen not only the skills of individual professionals in each country but also serve as a catalyst for creating more effective national and regional service delivery systems.

PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING

EXPANDING LOCAL SERVICE CAPACITY THROUGH PROFESSIONAL TRAINING

Through the generous support of several international foundations, ISPCAN has been able to support multiple professional training opportunities for its members and others working to prevent child abuse. In 2002, nearly 600 professionals received training in the identification, assessment, treatment and prevention of child abuse and neglect. Under the leadership of ISPCAN faculty and local institutional sponsors, these events provided a forum for local professionals from diverse backgrounds to collectively share the responsibility for building a more coordinated response to maltreatment within their communities.

For the past two years, ISPCAN's capacity to offer these types of training has been greatly enhanced through the ongoing support of the Oak Foundation. The ISPCAN Training and Local Capacity Building Program for Child Physical/Sexual Abuse Prevention and Treatment (ITPI) initially supported multiple training events in Argentina, Brazil, South Africa, Kenya, Malaysia and Thailand. As of July 2002, the Oak Foundation expanded its support to include training in Poland, Bulgaria, Estonia and Latvia.

All ISPCAN sponsored training programs focus on the following objectives:

- To expand local capacity within each country/region by improve the skills of local professionals.
- To link local professionals who receive training with other professional and educational opportunities within and outside their immediate regions.
- To develop mechanism to sustain reform over time.
